


National Mounted Police Services

PUBLIC RELATIONS

Every mounted instructor, regardless of his or her primary function, provides public relations for the entire municipality. In today's climate, PR is an important tool in dealing with the public.. Mounted officers can take advantage of this type of interest by conducting special demos, such as for school age children, COPS. programs are well suited for this type of PR work, and members can be specially trained for public relations work from horseback. Teaching officers to understand the importance of public relations is as important as understanding tactical situations.



TACTICAL and ADVANCED TACTICAL

A mounted tactical unit is an invaluable resource when situations need officers to not only handle situations where foot patrol officers are ineffective, but to be able to evolve from one tactical situation to another seamlessly. Special training is required to create an effective unit. It is imperative that the rider be confident to lead his or her mount into unfamiliar situations, such as civil unrest, riots, tactical extractions or assisting in guarding, escorting, or extracting politicians, rioters, high profile criminals or other persons of interest. Tactical team members must be trained in effective arrest techniques and be able to perform the task at hand while assuring the safety of his or her fellow officers.

Understanding the abilities of your fellow officers and their mounts, recognizing both the strong and weak points of both riders and horses and being able to evolve from one tactic to another are extremely important to every mounted officers' safety and effectiveness.

CROWD CONTROL

It is estimated that one mounted officer is as effective as ten-foot officers in a crowd control situation, due to the height of the officer and mount. Teaching mounted officers to understand the dynamics of a crowd and effectively report what is seen and heard from both height and proximity to the crowd give mounted police an advantage to street officers and even towers. Crowds will typically maneuver more readily in response to an oncoming horse. Training officers for crowd control situations requires a great deal of experience. In the training of the police mount sensory and obstacles need to be combined. It is imperative that an officer be able to control every movement his or her horse makes in a crowd, in order to effectively control

the crowd without creating a liability situation. The ability to teach these techniques require far more training than simple redundant practice.



MOUNTED PATROL

Mounted instructors must be able to teach the importance of patrol such as parks, downtown areas, and local business areas by being more accessible to civilians. This type of function requires training similar to that for crowd control situations, but with less assertiveness. This allows for providing public relations as well as security.

Mounted Obstacles and Sensory Training

There is a procedure to put a horse into a place or position that he/she doesn't want to go. Understanding how the vision and the learning process of the horse allows a rider to the place the mount into these positions. Mounted instructors incorporate techniques learned from both processes to teach the horse and students to maneuver the horse into these situations safely by gaining trust of their mount using the equine instinctual drive.
